Hamilton Forklift License - Obtaining a forklift license or forklift certification in North America would require the trainee to do hands-on training in addition to classroom instruction. The state, provincial and federal regulatory bodies are responsible for the training, licensing and certification for powered industrial truck operators. Operators could obtain a license either through training administered by the employer or by a third party. Regardless, regulatory requirements must be met. Recertification is necessary every two to three years.

Lift trucks are powered industrial trucks which come along with various alternatives, like for example stand-up and sit-down. There are different types and sizes of forklift suitable for different industrial uses. Operator training courses are usually individualized to address the certain kinds and uses for which the operator is training. Training on a gas-powered, sit-down lift truck inside a warehouse surroundings would not be the same as training on a propane-powered, stand-up lift truck within a shipyard. The various lift trucks and their uses makes it impossible to establish universal licensing requirements for all equipment and industries. Regulatory standards, hence, tend not to concentrate on detailed program requirements but rather on the outcome of individual training programs.

Employer-provided, on-the-job training is the most common method for operators to be given their forklift license or certification. This method of certification requires the employer to provide practical training and classroom sessions on machines in the workplace. Employers could choose to train employees on every kind of forklift separately, or to train them on all machinery combined. The curriculum incorporates lift truck operation methods, safety procedures, company rules and lift truck maintenance. Topics specific to the worksite, like hazardous conditions or materials, must be covered. Following classroom learning, operators are taught how to safely utilize and operate each and every kind of lift truck on the worksite.

When using a third party trainer, the certification process will usually consist of an on-site component with hands-on practice.

Normally, an employer-provided certification would not transfer from the present employer to the next employer. Obtaining a lift truck license through employer-provided training allows the operator to run a forklift for that particular employer only.

Forklift safety will always be an essential aspect of the lift truck license training, even though the particulars of the safety training will be dependent upon the equipment being utilized. Certain safety issues would differ for every industry and employer. Both employer-provided training and third-party providers might have to address additional requirements for safety training in applicable industries, like in offshore and marine uses.
